Either someone doesn't want to believe in the religious aspects, believes only in the commercial aspects, has trouble dealing with friends or family to a point where get-togethers are strained, wishes it were celebrated in a warmer time of year or the opposite and we should have a good covering of that common white stuff, or just get upset that it is celebrated at the incorrect time, according to the calendar and historic study. Growing up with family members that voiced such comments, I found I had to make the decision to celebrate in a way that would please myself, and yet have a meaningful relationship with my own value system. By the very name of the holiday, I concluded that if it was related to the person of Jesus, then His character attributes should be associated with our activities. Even if the time was not correct, the simple fact that most of the world stops, acknowledges, and even observes Christ's birth, should, at least, open the door for hope and celebration.

If you never had a problem, you wouldn't know that God could solve them. Em, notice, it was still raining. what changed was not the rain factor (adversity/challenge). To Salt or Not to Salt?

All salt is not created equal! There has been so much controversy on salt that many people are actually fearful about consuming it. Sodium is the third most vital element that our bodies require. What a lot of people don't realize is that our bodies need sodium in order for the potassium/sodium levels to be in balance within our cells. Also, our DNA is held together by the minerals we consume. In order to better understand, let's take a look at how salt is processed.

"White table salt is the by-product of the processing of earth salt after the valuable minerals have been extracted for sale to industry. The salt is subjected to a complicated process of refining, which includes heating the salt to over 2,000 degrees. The minerals are precipitated out of the salt, going through numerous processes, and then the salt is re-crystallized. To make the salt free flowing, an anti-caking agent is added, which has the unfortunate side-effect of turning the salt purple. . . It is bleached, and then glucose, talcum, aluminum silicate and. . . a few other things are added. The end product is 97.5 percent sodium chloride with no trace elements. This salt is poison to the body."

On the other hand, "Celtic [pronounced Keltic] salt. . . is harvested from the ocean in a 9,000 acre, pristine area of Brittany, in northwestern France. The area has been protected by the French government as a historic site, so that ancient traditions can be preserved for the future generations."

"To produce the salt, ocean water is channeled into a series of shallow ponds. The sun and wind evaporate the water, leaving a mineral-rich brine. The salt farmers then hand rake the brine with wooden tools, and within hours, crystals form and are gathered by hand. The method used for the whole process is a 2,000-year-old tradition in Brittany. This salt is unheated, and unrefined." (Living and Live Food, Alissa Cohen).

According to Barbara O'Neill, nutritionist and naturopath from Australia, "Sodium should be taken into the body the way it is found in nature. The largest concentration of sodium is found in sea water. Sea water contains 92 minerals." (Self Heal by Design, Barbara O'Neill). Both Himalayan and Celtic salt are unrefined sea salts that contain approximately 82-87 minerals respectively. Whereas table salt contains only two minerals: sodium and chloride. Without the other trace minerals, this is a dangerous combination that causes an electrolyte imbalance within our bodies as well as an acid effect, which then leads to a toxic environment in our bodies.

Another plus is that it contains three types of magnesium: magnesium chloride, magnesium sulphate and magnesium bromide. With these combinations, they are able to eliminate excess sodium from our bodies. For example, if you should become dehydrated, just dissolve a couple of Celtic salt granules on your tongue followed by drinking a glass of water. The magnesium combos of the Celtic salt will literally pull that water into your cells and help you to be rehydrated. Not only will you feel better, but it will give you an energy boost as well.

With this valuable information, you can now see why Celtic salt is a far superior choice for your sodium requirements. Salt may appear to be an insignificant part of your lifestyle, but table salt can create havoc and cause major repercussions within our entire body.

My advice for you is to carry a small amount of Celtic salt with you wherever you go especially during the hot summer months. It could literally be a lifesaver!

When we completed the trip out west, finally had arrived at our destination, we were full of expectation and anticipation. Waking in the morning to find sleet coming down, didn't put much of a damper, as I'd already been warned that snow could be part of the picture. We had been warned a day ahead of time, that roads were closing, and we'd be tight getting in before the storm. As the day played out in reality, we enjoyed a nice warm breakfast and headed out to backpack and see what we could see. We hiked around for a couple of hours, enjoying the mountain air, the view, and a little less, the brisk temps/wind. It wasn't long, before the wet boots let us know, there would be no more safe hiking, until we all had dry gear. We sat for what seemed like hours in that tiny little cabin. Frustration and disappointment started to build, as one suggested we head back east, before we were snowed in for the winter, and one couldn't hike because of wet gear-and one couldn't go out alone, because of the threat of bears nearby. As the afternoon lazed away, frustration, fear, and anxiety were building in my heart. The 2nd day held it's own challenges, as one got separated, and we spent time looking and looking until we were reunited, and then once again, we were cabin bound because of the wet boots. It didn't take long until the cozy little cabin felt more like a prison.

I decided I had to get out in the fresh air and have a chat with God to change my spirit and feelings, so I donned all my snow gear, and wandered out to the swing by the river. There, I began chatting with him about all the challenges and frustration. He brought to mind Job's comment I'd read just that AM "Shall we indeed accept good from God, and shall we not accept adversity?" As I pondered the bit of adversity I was facing, it was clear that I just wanted MY WAY-as I thought of 2 friends back east, who were in the height of battling cancer, I realized I was just pouting. I asked God to forgive me, and help me find a better state of mind. My thoughts were interrupted with the lowing of a cow, and I looked up to see some just across the river from me. God asked me, "Will you choose to accept adversity from God's hand? Look at the cattle across the river from you. Tell me about them Em."

I replied, "Well Lord, they look totally calm, totally happy-some of them are grazing, and some are lying down and chewing their cud. Some are just standing watch."

"Tell me Em, " He responded, "what sort of grazing is available, and what type of place to lie down?"

"Well Lord, they are either at the river's edge-just above the water and rocks, or just above that. The landscape is strewn with downed limbs and trees, and rocks. They are in the shade of the pine trees. The grass isn't all that green. Frankly, on the upper aspect, I can barely see any. They don't have much really-no shelter, COLD water, what looks to be harsh grazing conditions. Plus there are no fences, so therefore no security-no-one to feed and care for them, no-one to give them grain, no-one to supply them with hay, no-one to protect and provide for them. They have plenty of predators;-wolves, grizzly bears and black bears. Yet they are healthy and content"

"Em, notice how the cattle are resting contented in the midst of their mess. They didn't demand all the rocks, sticks, obstacles and dangers to be removed. They have an element of danger that could come at any moment, so you could say they should be stressed and full of fear."

"Lord, are you asking me to rest in the midst of my mess? What exactly are you saying?"

"Em, do you see the calf all laid out, relaxing with just one ear tuned for danger? What I'm trying to tell you, is that you need to rest sometimes-it can't always be about fixing, working, doing, stressing. Ultimately, make the most of your journey. My child, they don't have guns or fences, or anything to protect them, and yet you see a state of calm-of peace and enjoyment of the blessings they are afforded today. Em, read Psalm 23."

"Wow, Lord" I responded. Somehow I see it differently than I ever have before. They do have green pastures I suppose-there is some tiny hint of green. It's not nearly as green as the grass on this side of the river, yet they are contented in their circumstances. They're not bawling for greener pastures, they're just enjoying the pasture at hand. When I look at them lying down, again, it's not nearly as nice as this side of the river, and yet they are relaxed amidst the rocks and broken limbs. Lord, their water isn't calm, and it's VERY cold-yet they drink from it and are refreshed. Lord, I sense you asking me to face the adversity of my situation with grace, poise, and thanksgiving. I sense you asking me to accept the pasture (circumstances) where I live. God, David spoke of restoring his soul-I long to be restored."

"My God shall supply ALL your needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:19. Em, my word is life to you. Come to the quiet. Time to relax, is just as important as all the duties of life."

"Lord, it talks of leading us in the paths of righteousness for your names' sake. What are paths of righteousness?"

"A path of righteousness refines, defines, shapes, and clarifies you. Your path will have some challenges, some ups and downs, some obstacles, some rewards, and some dangers."

"Lord, as I look at the cattle walking through a literal valley, one that could lead to their death, it takes on new meaning. They are not afraid-though they never know where the next grizzly resides. Lord, when I think about how a rod and staff could comfort, I remember a rod was used for guidance and correction-but it also confirmed the shepherd's presence, and provided a sense of safety. It is a comfort to know that you're still here with me, in my circumstances, and that you value me enough to correct me and care for me. Lord, as I think on the next verse, You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies-Wow Lord-you've prepared a table so to speak, for them, with enemies all around. I have to say, I see Psalm 23 a whole lot differently-and my life circumstances differently as well. Thank you God, for helping me to see, that you are there in the midst of our mess.

Something to Think About

My friend, Caren Churkey, has introduced me in the past couple years to a new genre, for me... Christian fiction. Even more recently, I've discovered, through her, the popular Christian author, Michael R. Phillips. I realize some Adventists do not appreciate that type of literature but I've been amazed at the wonderfully spiritual insights that Mr. Phillips presents in his books. They are especially evident in his series on Corrie Belle Hollister, a story of a young Christian woman set during the middle 1800s. In his books, Corrie is a journalist, writing for a newspaper, who meets President Lincoln, General Grant and others, and the influence she has upon them. She eventually marries....well, no, I don't want to give anything away. Read it for yourself. Here are some excerpts throughout the last book in that series "A New Beginning" by Michael R. Phillips that impressed me very much. Some parts I put in brackets [] to update the description from the 1800s:

"Listen to what Jesus tells us to do—lend money when asked, visit those in prison, don't envy, do good, show mercy, feed the hungry, treat others kindly, pray to your Father in Heaven, speak graciously, take accountability for your actions, love your neighbor, do to others what you would like them to do to you."

"Everything in God's kingdom is inverted from the ways of man. Man says 'Get all you can and you will be happy.' God says, 'Give what you have, and you will have riches indeed.' Man says 'Raise yourself up.' God says, 'Put yourself to death.' Man says, 'The greatest goal is to possess.' God says 'The highest ambition in life is to relinquish.' Man says, 'To be served by others is to be great.' God says 'Greatness is measured by servant hood.' Man says 'The first are first and the last are last.'

God says, 'The last shall be first and the first last.'

* * * *

"The things that have eternal value have to do with character, with the kind of people we are, more than the things we do. Internal things rather than external. It's not always as easy as saying that we ought to be helping people. If we're not becoming more Christlike as a result, then of what permanent value is it? I may fix [Mrs. Jones' car], but if inside I'm annoyed about the inconvenience, what will be the permanent benefit to my eternal character from having done it?"

But what about Mrs. Jones? Doesn't she benefit whether I was annoyed or not? How does she benefit?? By having her car in good working order? How does that benefit *her* eternally? That car will go up with all the wood, bricks and stubble.

But what if your fixing her car benefited Mrs. Jones *internally*? What if you helped her eternal character somehow by doing it? When we are becoming more internally Christlike from what we do, or when we are in some small way helping *another* man or woman to become more internally Christlike themselves...then we are expending our energies upon things of eternal value.

Everything else we do, everything else we are, is going to vanish the instant we die. Some poor individuals will be left with very impoverished natures. Others will find themselves giants of character in the kingdom of Heaven because of the multitude of small acts and choices of Christ like kindness they demonstrated in this life. Turning ourselves constantly toward such a focus, and helping others to orient their lives likewise toward Jesus, is life's ultimate goal."

MONTHLY HEALTH NUGGET

Our Small and Large Intestines

After we eat a meal, we remember it for a short time and then forget. The meal is forgotten, but not yet gone. After our stomach next finishes its work, then it goes to the intestines.

The intestines are a long, continuous hollow tube running from the stomach to the anus. This tube is folded many times so that it can fit inside the abdomen. The absorption of most nutrients and water happens in the intestines. The intestines include the small intestine, large intestine, and rectum.

The small intestine (small bowel) is about 20 feet long and about an inch in diameter. Its job is to absorb most of the nutrients from what we eat and drink. Mostly these are found in the chyme (the semi liquid form of food after it has been partially digested). The nutrients are absorbed through finger like villa. Velvety tissue lines the small intestine. The small intestine is divided into 3 parts: the **duodenum**, **jejunum**, **and ileum**.

The duodenum -is the first and shortest segment of the small intestine. It receives partially digested food (known as chyme) from the stomach and plays a vital role in the chemical digestion of chyme in preparation for absorption in the small intestine.

The Jejunum -most of the nutrient absorption is done in this part of the digestive tract. Simple sugars, water soluble vitamins (except vitamin C and some Bs) and amino acids made from the food are passed from the villi into the blood stream while the fat is passed into the lymph capillaries. The rest of the food passes into the ileum.

The Ileum -The function of this area is mainly to absorb vitamin B_{12} and bile salts plus whatever products of digestion were not absorbed by the jejunum. The wall itself is made up of folds, each of which has many tiny finger-like projections known as villi on its surface.

The large intestine (colon or large bowel) consists of 3 parts: **The cecum, colon and rectum**. The large intestine is about 5 feet long and about 2 to 3 inches in diameter. The large bowel is the place where most of the water absorption happens. When the water is absorbed, it leaves behind the undigested part of the food, known as stool. Waste is solid because most of the water has been removed by the intestines

The **Cecum** -The main **functions** of the **cecum** are to absorb fluids and salts that remain after completion of intestinal digestion and absorption and to mix its contents with a lubricating substance called mucus. The internal wall of the **cecum** is composed of a thick mucous membrane, through which water and salts are absorbed.

The appendix is found at the end of the Cecum it acts as a reservoir for beneficial bacteria that is kept in the body in case you lose your normal intestinal bacteria; the appendix can repopulate it. Some species of bacteria have evolved to live inside a human's intestine and help them digest their food by breaking it down.

The **Colon** (ascending colon, transverse colon, descending colon and sigmoid flexure) Its **function** is to reabsorb fluids and process waste products from the body and prepare for its elimination. The **colon** consists of four sections:, ascending **colon**, transverse **colon**, descending **colon** and sigmoid **colon**.

--- **Rectum** and anus are the final stages of the digestive tract. The **rectum** is the last straight section of the large intestine before reaching the anus.

The Anus is a set of muscles, called a sphincter, at the end of the large intestine the holds back the waste until it is time to release them. When the stool enters the rectum the nerves in that area send impulses to the brain which make the urge to defecate. The pelvic floor muscle creates an angle between the rectum and the anus that stops stool from coming out when it is not supposed to. The internal sphincter is always tight, except when stool enters the rectum.

Next month, we will learn about digestive enzymes, nutrient absorption and various conditions that afflict the intestines.

We ask for your mercy. We beg for your grace. In tears we come to you on our knees, confessing our sins and our transgressions. Lord, please give us a clean heart, a new soft heart to replace our stony dead heart. Lord, in your mercy, we plead for wisdom, Your wisdom, so we can glorify your righteous name in this wicked land we live, so we can lift up Your word before a fallen people so that many more may believe in you."

That night of prayer and pleading to God changed their hearts. God did reveal the secret they were seeking. God, in His mercy, He gave the young men a chance to glorify God and save many lives, including their own. Daniel praised God for His infinite wisdom. All wisdom belongs to God. God is wisdom. God sets up Kingdoms and tears down kingdoms. God knows the beginning from the end. He knows all secrets of every heart, no matter how deep or how dark they might be. God reveals all things. He has foretold the entirety of world history in a single dream. God has a plan for His people. We are to be His mouthpiece; we are to be His hands. We are to be His feet.

Lord in your mercy and in your infinite grace, open our eyes to see you, open our ears to hear your word. Then dear Jesus, send us, use us, and direct our path. Put us in the place that you can use us most. Loosen our legs so that we will go. Give us your faith so we can take the first step. Remove the fear that holds us back, unclench our jaw so that we can speak boldly before our rulers, bosses, and supervisors; our family, our enemies and our friends; about your saving sacrifice, about the new life, separate from our current sins and vices, about how you cleanse our heart like you cleanse the sanctuary. As You are cleansing the heavenly sanctuary of our sins; please cleanse our hearts of our sins. Wipe our mistakes away. Remove our attachment the rebellion. Bring us back to perfection.
