This takes teamwork, patience, and even at times a willingness to sacrifice your opinion. Pray like never before for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit to unite us in love, truth, and purpose. We SDA's know from prophecy that persecution will come to God's faithful before the end of this world - but that is a direct response to our united and faithful effort. Working together is not easy, but the body of Jesus Christ united in bringing hope to the suffering and downtrodden will ignite a flame so bright and strong that all the evil forces of this world can never quench."

There are at least a couple of lessons to take away from this experience of John's. First of all was the change in what John heard behind him and what he saw when he turned around. Then he saw and heard the ever gentle Jesus putting His hand on John to comfort him saying I'll never leave you, I am the first and the last. Second, there is the sound of the trumpet that John heard behind him. Before he could see his Master, Jesus had to get his attention! If you hear the sound of the trumpet behind you please respond. Jesus wants to lay is hand on you and tell you not to be afraid that He will always be with you.

One more thing about that trumpet call: who is going to sound it today! Jesus has given that responsibility to you and to me and His church! What I learned in the military

In 1970 Uncle Sam called me to go fight a war in Vietnam. I didn't call him. However I did my duty and in the process learned many lessons. Some are important lessons that could even help the church and yes, some are not.

1. Military: We had a book called the SOP (standard operating procedure). If you wanted to know how to do something you looked it up in the SOP. It was written by men of experience, men that had been tested by war and knew what worked and what didn't. Only a dummy would ignore the SOP.

Church: We have the SOP- Spirit of Prophecy that is the testimony of Jesus. Jesus is that man of experience and His Spirit has revealed our standard operating procedure for the last days in the Bible and the writings of E. G. White and only a fool would ignore it. Don't leave home without it in your heart.

2. Military: Wear all your armor. In Vietnam, because of the heat, we would sometimes go out on patrol in the jungle without our flak jacket and even our helmets. They were hot and heavy. It was easier to walk around without them. But the object of war is to find and engage the enemy. And when we did this it would be much safer to have these on rather than back at the

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JOSEPH

Joseph was the 11th son of Jacob but the 1st son of Rachel. When Rachel conceived, and bare a son; she said, God hath taken away my reproach: And she called his name Joseph.

Gen 30:23:24

Nothing more is said about Joseph until Gen 37:2- 4 And this is the story of Jacob's family. Joseph, a young man of seventeen, took care of the sheep and goats with his brothers, the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's concubines. He brought bad reports to his father about what his brothers were doing.

Jacob loved Joseph more than all his other sons; He made a special long robe with full sleeves for him that had many colors. His brothers knew that their father loved Joseph more than he loved them and they hated him.

Then in Verse 13 and 14 we read how Jacob sent Joseph to go see how his brothers and the flock of sheep were doing in Shechem. Joseph eventually found them at Dothan.

Gen 37:18 They (his brothers) saw him in the distance, and before he reached them, they plotted against him and decided to kill him.

Well, it turned out that they did not kill Joseph, but sold him as a slave to the Ishmaelites. Then they wondered what to tell their father. They still had Joseph's coat. They dipped it in blood, as if Joseph had been had been killed by a wild animal.

Everyone agreed that the deception was perfect. Naturally Jacob would believe that a lion had done the job. They wouldn't even have to lie about it openly-though that would have been no great matter. Best of all, they were through with Joseph, for good. But in years to come, they would remember this day with an agonizing mixture of guilt, wonder, and fear.

It turns out that Joseph is one of the few characters of whom he Bible records no faults. One cannot really expect to find men of that superior quality more than once or twice in a lifetime. Joseph's excellence called for the very best blessings of both Jacob and Moses. The father's blessings for some of his son's, particularly those of the concubines, were brief and sometimes vague. But when he came to Joseph, the old patriarch's heart overflowed, and his prophecy poured forth in expressive words and rich figures of speech:

Joseph is a fruitful bough, a beautiful bough by a spring;

His branches run over the wall.

The archers fiercely attack him, shot at him, and harassed him sorely;

Yet his bow remained unmoved, his arms were made agile by the hands of the Mighty One of Jacob. Gen. 49:23,24,RSV.

Joseph's triple blessing of heart, soul, and body surpassed all others and endures forever:

God Almighty...will bless you with blessings of heaven above, blessings of the deep that couches beneath,

Health Tip: Could this skin lesion be cancerous?

Identification of common types of skin cancer

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States, occurring in over two million people each year. Three of the most common types of skin cancer are squamous cell carcinoma, basal cell carcinoma, and melanoma. Each has characteristic features that can help alert you to the possibility that you may have developed a skin cancer.

Squamous cell skin cancers (SCC) arise from squamous cells which comprise most of skin's outer layer (epidermis). Since these are often related to UV exposure from the sun, they most commonly develop on the face, ears, arms or hands. In their earliest form, they often appear as rough, scaly, red patches. Unlike a skin rash that may fade with time, however, these rough patches persist and continue to progress slowly. Over time, they may become crusted, bleed, or develop an indentation in the center of the lesion. On occasion a SCC may have a wart-like appearance.

Approximately 40% to 60% of squamous cell skin cancers begin as a pre-malignant lesion known as an actinic keratosis (AK). Also known as solar keratosis, these develop on sun-exposed areas of the body such as the face, arms, backs of hands, and lips. An AK is usually rough in texture, resembling a wart, and may be felt before actual changes of the skin are noted. Their color can range from flesh-toned to brown or red. Most are small, less than a half inch across. Approximately 10% of AKs progress to become squamous cell skin cancer.



Basal cell carcinoma (BCC) develops in the basal cell layer of the skin, the deepest layer of the epidermis. It is the most common type of skin cancer occurring in the U.S. BCCs are usually seen in areas of the body that have been exposed to the sun, such as the face or arms. Warning signs that should alert someone to the possibility of a BCC include:

- A persistent open sore that bleeds or oozes. On occasion, these may appear to heal only to re-open and bleed again.
- A pearly bump or nodule that may be pink, red, or white. Small blood vessels may be apparent on the surface.
- A lesion with a crater-like appearance with elevated border and indentation in the center.

An area of skin that is shiny and tight like a scar that develops without injury. **Melanoma** is a cancer of the pigment producing cells (melanocytes) of the skin. The great majority of melanomas can be attributed to exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun. Melanoma begins on the surface of the skin but over time can extend deeper and in some cases, even spread throughout the body. Signs indicating that a skin lesion could be a melanoma include new pigmented area on the skin, or a change in size, shape or color of an existing mole. The ABCDE rule is another way to recognize melanomas:

• Asymmetry: A mole that has an irregular shape, or the shape of one half does not match the other half.





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• Border: The edges are often irregular, blurred, rough, or notched in outline.

- Color: Most moles are evenly colored, e.g. brown, black, or tan. Changes in the shade or distribution of color throughout the mole can signal melanoma.
- Diameter: Moles larger than 1/4 inch (6 mm, the size of a pencil eraser) across are suspicious.

Evolving: The mole has changed over the past few weeks or months

Regular examination of the skin, by a physician or by self-examination, is the key to identifying skin cancers in their earliest stages. Any suspicious lesion should be brought to the attention of your primary care doctor or a dermatologist. Next week we'll look at how these common forms of skin cancer are treated and learn the best ways of preventing skin cancer.

base in our lockers.

Church: We must engage the enemy by rescuing his prisoners. Eph 6:11 "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil." Don't leave home without it.

3. Military: We were at war. We were not at the banquet table having a big victory steak back in San Francisco.

Church: We are at war. We are not at the banquet table in heaven yet. Don't become drunk with the cares or pleasures of this life. We are soldiers. Do your duty and you can save yourself and maybe someone else too. Mt 7:21; Lk 17:10; Eph 2:8-10; Lk 13:24; Phil 2:12, Jas 5:20.

4. Military: War is not like the movies. It is not glorious. It is death and dying. But it is also many hours of boring. During these periods of boredom you clean your weapon. You fill sand bags to shore up the defenses because you know that the enemy will come back. The question is not if but when.

Church: In the Christian life there are periods of peace and periods of stress. Use those periods of peace to sharpen your sword. Don't just read the Bible like you read other books, study it. Study it like your life depends upon it. "The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are seeking and longing for channels through which to communicate to the world the divine principles of truth." {8T 194.1}

5. Military: The enemy shoots at us because he is the enemy, that's what his job is. You never ask, "Why doesn't he like me?"

Church: - When we have a flat tire on the way to an important meeting we tend to ask, "God, why did you do this to me?" Our heavenly Father is not our enemy, satan is. He shoots at us flaming arrows, that's what his character is.

6. Military: Don't shoot your fellow soldiers. You need each other. Take care of each other especially when one is wounded. However, you don't ignore a Benedict Arnold, you can't just smile and hug him and pretend that all is ok. There must be discipline and severe consequences to one that is giving aid to the enemy. To neglect to do so would imperil the lives of many other soldiers.

Church: We need each other. Don't look out for just your own interests but for the welfare of others, especially the wounded. Pray, don't gossip, about others. Don't judge their motives, thoughts or secret intentions of the heart. However

open sin in the church must be dwelt with. Read Rev 3:19; 1 Cor 5 and 6; AA 503,504; 3T 252-294 in the SOP. If open sin is either ignored or we "are proud that we have open minds about such things" then God's displeasure is upon the church. The eternal lives of many others is at stake.

7. Military: For the watchman on the walls do you really want a soft spoken man? No, his job is to awaken us to the danger coming even in the middle of the night. It is not "fun" to be awakened at this hour but the potential consequences of not being shaken are far worse. Don't shoot the watchman. He is not the enemy.

Church: We continually hear, "The church must be a safe place for all." Is the church to "feel" like a safe place to those wallowing in sin? No, we need some Elijah's and John the Baptist's as well as some like John the beloved in the church. Jesus message is, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." In writing about Christ being the true Vine and we being the branches the SOP speaks of our Father's love in these ways, "The pruning will cause pain, but it is the Father who applies the knife. He works with no wanton hand or indifferent heart. There are branches trailing upon the ground; these must be cut loose from the earthly supports to which their tendrils are fastening. They are to reach heavenward, and find their support in God." DA 677

8. Military: Train your men and then trust your men. The orders come down the chain of command of what to do and then the grunt soldiers go and do it. You have trained them for this, then don't micromanage or you will never grow new leaders. The Japanese soldiers of World War II were great at following orders but if their leader was killed then there was no one to give orders and they didn't know what to do. They were unlike the American army where the next in line would step in and take command. This is one of the reasons that Japan lost the war.

Church: Pastors, train the church from the SOP and then trust your church. The orders come straight from the Holy Spirit to each soldier and He (God's Spirit) will never guide them to go against the SOP. Don't get between them (laymen) and their Supreme Commander. 5T 462.

The blessings of your father are mighty, beyond...the bounties of the everlasting hills. (v. 25,26)RSV.

The Bible generally does not concern itself much with the outward appearance of persons. Therefore Joseph's description as "handsome" and "good-looking" Gen 39:6 not only accounts for the wandering desires of Potiphar's wife but also indicates that he must have been an exceptional man, **without** as well as **within**.

In our present sin-tainted context, overwhelming goodness inevitably has its drawbacks. The favorite child of a favorite wife, Joseph knew no lack of fatherly love and generosity. Unlike the ordinary spoiled child however, **he had enormous resources of faith and fortitude** that enabled him to survive 17 years (maybe more) of sibling rivalry and 13 years of slavery and unjust imprisonment.

First, the remarkable **integrity** Joseph exhibited attracted a variety of people.

His father entrusted the boy with adult tasks. Potiphar turned over all his household affairs to his teenage slave. The jailor put him in charge of the prison to which the Egyptian authorities had sentenced him. And finally, the Pharaoh gave him the administration of all Egypt, withholding only the crown itself.

Second, Joseph's **trustworthiness** was coupled with his unusual leadership abilities. Some have criticized his financial policies with the Egyptians (Gen 47:20-26). Still efficiency and honest management have always been too rare. Our inability to get things done now and to get them done right has always been a universal vexation from the beginning of time. With Joseph in charge, no one needed to worry. Along with all of their other talents, the Joseph's among us inspire a remarkable sense of security.

Third, Joseph was a **wise man with keen insights**. Thanks to the disguise of language, costume and cosmetics, he spoke with his brothers face to face for months before he revealed his identity. During that time he ran several revealing tests by which he could satisfy himself as to the present state of relationships within his father's house. Through the ruse of his silver cup secreted in Benjamin's sack of grain, he compounded the mounting anxiety his brothers felt over the rough-speaking "lord of the land." What deed is this that you have done? Do you not know that such a man as I can indeed divine? Gen 44:15.

Integrity, leadership and wisdom are excellent, but sometimes can be severe traits. Joseph, however tempered exemplary righteousness with tender feeling. Repeatedly the plight of his family moved him to tears: at the first sight of his brothers, at his meeting with Benjamin, at Jacob's arrival in Egypt, and at the death of his father. No record exists of his ever weeping over his own misfortunes.

Outwardly an Egyptian but inwardly still an Israelite, Joseph never let fame and affluence lessen his allegiance to the God of his fathers. His 80 years in the pharaoh's court ended in a state funeral and a temporary burial in an Egyptian tomb. But when the Israelite slaves made their 40 year journey back to Canaan, they carried his mummified body with them. His final resting place was Shechem, the home of his childhood..

Reflecting Jacob's earlier blessing, Moses also celebrated the spiritual and material wealth of the tribe of Joseph in a beautiful blend of prophecy and prayer.

when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

12. Military: The best time of the day is mail call. You long for letters from home. Your beloved has written each day and it says almost the same thing, "I love you. I can hardly wait for the day that you are with me and I hold you in my arms." She writes this over and over and it is never boring. It is fresh every time you pick up those letters. That is unless you choose another lover.

Church: Jesus says, "I love you. I can hardly wait for the day that you are with me and I hold you in my arms." But here is where the military analogy breaks down. We do not have to wait for this experience until some future day. "Jesus loves to have us come to Him just as we are, sinful, helpless, dependent. We may come with all our weakness, our folly, our sinfulness, and fall at His feet in penitence. It is His glory to encircle us in the arms of His love and to bind up our wounds, to cleanse us from all impurity." AG 82.2; SC 52.

May their ancient hills be covered with choice fruit.

May their land be filled with all that is good, Blessed by the goodness of the LORD, Who spoke from the burning bush. May these blessings come to the tribe of Joseph, Because he was the leader among his brothers.

Let the blessing come upon the head of Joseph, and upon the top of the head of him that was separated from his brethren.

But Joseph had known deep sorrows, the anguish of separation, and loneliness.

In a sense Joseph had always been "separated from his brethren, "cast in a nobler mold. But Joseph had known deep sorrows, the anguish of separation, and loneliness In his youth his temper and tastes were superior to theirs. Where they were coarse, vulgar, and cruel, he was refined, gentle and thoughtful. Thus the violent, murderous separation when they sold Joseph into Egypt came almost naturally. In later life, his affectionate, generous treatment of them set him apart from the ordinary breed of men.

Little wonder that the name Joseph has enjoyed such a wide popularity among Jews and Christians alike. One could hardly bear a name with more distinguished ancestry.

The Joseph's become what they are **in** adversity. Like their character-original, they received shaping and polishing in the fires of trial and suffering. Their integrity and excellence are not simple accidents of heredity or haphazard gifts of environment. **Joseph's life demonstrates the benefits of trouble.** By such means he became one of the most perfect archetypes of the character of Christ. Likewise the contemporary Josephs among us have an unbounded influence for good. They infuse spiritual vitality into the Christian church. Through their ministry we maintain the faith and hope necessary to carry us home to the Promised Land.

Joseph's name is on one of the gates of the Holy City. He is paired up with Andrew, the brother of Peter.


